



2 + 2 Articulation Agreement Wichita State University & Independence Community College

Teacher Apprentice Program

(Early Childhood Unified & Elementary Education, Birth-6th grade)

and

Elementary Education Program, K-6th grade

The purpose of this 2 + 2 agreement is to provide Independence Community College students the opportunity to transfer coursework from Independence Community College to Wichita State University (WSU) in pursuit of a baccalaureate degree, with a major in Early Childhood Unified and Elementary Education, Birth-6th grade (online- TAP Program) OR Elementary Education, K-6th grade (face-to-face main campus program).

The 2 + 2 articulation agreement identifies requirements, options, equivalencies, and parameters, which will benefit many students for years to come. This document also includes a program of study with a list of equivalent Independence Community College and WSU courses by term for the first two years at Independence Community College, and a list of WSU courses to complete upon transfer to the four-year institution.

Teacher Apprentice Program (Online Program):

The agreement is for Independence Community College students who have:

- Earned an Associate of Science (A.S.) in Elementary Education
- Achieved a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0
- Employed as a para educator at the ECU-6th grade level with instructional responsibilities within an interrelated or regular education classroom at a building accredited by KSDE (Kansas State Department of Education) or licensed by KDHE (Kansas Department of Health & Environment) or a similar setting
- Applied for admission to WSU as a transfer student or adult learner
- Completed program admission requirements (<u>www.wichita.edu/tap</u>) to the Teacher Apprentice Program

Students considered an adult learner or transfer student based on WSU admission requirements have the option to be dual enrolled in the TAP Program within teacher education courses and completing their general education course requirements at Independence Community College in pursuit of their A.S. in Elementary Education by following the TAP degree plan outlined at this link. www.wichita.edu/tap.





Independence Community College students meeting the above requirements for the TAP program will:

- Be guaranteed admission to WSU with completion of application requirements and receipt of transcripts
- Enter with junior status towards a baccalaureate degree
- Meet WSU General Education Policy or KBOR policy
- Be guaranteed to transfer credits (100 level and higher) up to but not exceeding 60 credits
 with an earned grade of C- or better for general education foundation coursework, D- or
 higher for the other general education coursework, and B- or higher for specific teacher
 education coursework as designated on the program of study
- Earn 122-124 credit hours if they choose to complete the online, TAP (Teacher Apprentice Program) program. The TAP degree program at WSU requires a minimum of 120 credit hours, but because of degree requirements at both institutions this agreement will result in 122-124 credit hours earned

OR

Elementary Education, K-6th grade (On Campus Program):

The agreement is for Independence Community College students who have:

- Earned an Associate of Science (A.S.) in Education
- Achieved a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5
- Applied for admission to WSU

Independence Community College students meeting the admission requirements for the oncampus program will:

- Be guaranteed admission to WSU with completion of application requirements and receipt of transcripts
- Enter with junior status towards a baccalaureate degree
- Meet WSU General Education Policy or KBOR policy
- Be guaranteed to transfer credits (100 level and higher) up to but not exceeding 60 credits
 with an earned grade of C- or better for general education foundation coursework, D- or
 higher for the other general education coursework, and B- or higher for specific teacher
 education coursework as designated on the program of study
- Earn 132-134 credit hours if they choose to complete the on-campus Elementary Education, K-6th degree program. The Elementary Education, K-6th degree program at WSU requires a minimum of 120 credit hours, but because of degree requirements at both institutions this agreement will result in 132-134 credit hours earned.





Admission/Program/Graduation information

General Education Coursework: The completion and transfer of general education coursework will vary based on the program of study for the specific Independence Community College program. General education courses must be at least three (3) credit hours and from the approved general education course list at Wichita State University

(https://www.wichita.edu/academics generaleducation/). Students transferring from Independence Community College are required to meet the approved general education program at WSU at the time of transfer. Advisors and students should reference the Wichita State University Transfer Equivalency guide for specific courses - http://webapps.wichita.edu/TransferEquiv or community college transfer guides.

Admission to WSU: To apply for admission, students may contact the WSU Admission office by calling: (316) 978-3085. Information and applications are located online at https://www.wichita.edu/admissions/index.php.

Students transferring to WSU from Independence Community College who have completed an A.S. must meet the necessary requirements for admission to WSU, and will have their transcript evaluated on an individual basis.


Reverse Transfer: Based on Reverse Transfer, candidates following the TAP or Elementary Education plan of study at WSU are eligible to utilize this process to complete required credit hours at Independence Community College for the attainment of any A.S. for which one is eligible (see Reverse transfer @

https://www.wichita.edu/admissions undergraduate/transfertowsu)

Graduation Requirements: For graduation from the online WSU Teacher Apprentice Program with an Early Childhood Unified/Elementary Education degree OR the on-campus Elementary Education, K-6 program, students will need to fulfill transfer coursework from Independence Community College along with all WSU general education requirements, degree requirements, and must meet all requirements for graduation as outlined by WSU.

All students, including those transferring from a two-year college, must complete at least 60 hours of four-year college work, including 45 hours of upper-division work, in order to qualify for graduation from Wichita State.

ARTICULATION AGREEMENT Between

Baker University-Baldwin City and Independence Community College

The purpose of this Articulation Agreement is to establish collaboration between Baker University-Baldwin City and Independence Community College. This Agreement provides a systematic plan enabling students to transfer their Independence credit hours to Baker University-Baldwin City. While Baker welcomes applications for admission from any student, this agreement pertains to students who earn an Associate of/in Arts (A.A.) or Associate of/in Science (A.S.) degree with a cumulative grade point average of 2.50 or higher on a 4.00 scale. Students whose cumulative transfer GPA is 2.49 or below will also benefit from the terms of this agreement if the relevant Baker faculty committee grants them admission.

The following points detail distinctions of this agreement:

- Guaranteed admission to Baker University-Baldwin City.
- Community college coursework completes all Baker Quest (general education) requirements except for QS231Transfer Quest (3 credits), QS311 Global Culture and Community (3 credits) and, QS411 Global Citizenship (3 credits).
- Transfer students whose cumulative GPA is greater than 2.60 will automatically qualify for an academic scholarship. The dollar amount of the renewable scholarship is determined based on the cumulative GPA. All students admitted via this articulation agreement are also entitled to consideration for additional sources of financial aid based on extracurricular involvement and financial need.
- Students admitted via this agreement will have full access to all Baker University support services including admission and financial aid representatives, academic advising, the Student Academic Success Center, Student Affairs staff, etc.
- Those students who transfer to Baker under the terms of this agreement will benefit from all
 privileges assigned to other students, including class-standing priority in residence hall
 selection, access to competitive programs, course registration, and beyond.
- Baker guarantees the acceptance of all A.A. or A.S. degree program credits, as long as the
 course are considered to be at the college level and grades are C- or higher. This
 acceptance does include courses counted towards the A.A. or A.S. degree originally taken
 through high school dual enrollment arrangements.
- Baker University does grant credit for work completed through the College-Level
 Examination Program (CLEP), Advanced Placement Tests (AP), and International
 Baccalaureate Program (IB). Details regarding score requirements appear in the Baker
 University Academic Catalog.

Students interested in transferring to Baker University should take the following steps:

- Complete a Baker University application for admission as found at www.bakeru.edu/apply.
 There is no application for admission fee.
- Submit an official copy of either the final high school transcript or GED scores.
- Submit official copies of academic transcripts from all colleges attended.
 - o In order to honor this articulation agreement Baker University must receive an official transcript showing completion of the A.A. or A.S. degree.

- Submit appropriate credentials from any CLEP, AP, or IB experiences.
- Consult with the Office of Financial Aid regarding Baker University scholarship options and recommended completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as found at www.fafsa.gov.
- After receiving an offer of admission and assuring family comfort with financing details, Baker University representatives will provide assistance with all subsequent enrollment steps including housing, board plan selection, course registration, health services details, orientation, etc.

Students are admitted to the Teacher Education Program once a year for the spring semester. Complete an online application at http://soe.ku.edu/admission/ by mid-September for the next spring semester. A complete application also includes essays, and letters of reference. Students are notified of decisions in writing by mid-October. Kansas Board of Regents policy determines some admission requirements. Typically, students apply during the fall of their sophomore year to begin at KU in the spring of their sophomore year. After admission, five semesters are required to complete the degree. This includes two semesters of student teaching.

- Admissions for all School of Education programs are competitive.
- The minimum grade point average (GPA) to be admitted is 2.75. A competitive GPA is 3.2 or higher.
- Courses listed in the "Admissions Requirements" box must be completed before admission to the Teacher
 Education program is possible. Courses listed here can be in progress during the semester you are applying.
- For admissions purposes only, an approved science with lab can be substituted for geography with lab.

Make sure to meet with a School of Education advisor before you decide to come to KU. Given your proximity to KU, it may be easier to contact an advisor via the phone, email or video chat (i.e. Skype), which is perfectly acceptable.

Because enrollment in competitive programs is limited to prescribed numbers, students who meet minimum admission standards may not be accepted. Prospective teacher education students should consult an advisor early in the first year to ensure fulfillment of admission requirements and to plan efficient programs of study.

Articulation Agreement

Introduction

This articulation agreement formally recognizes that the University of Phoenix and Independence Community College are educational institutions which agree to work together to provide educational opportunities for the currently enrolled and potential students of their institutions. Agreement to this alliance requires a commitment by both institutions to facilitate the transfer of an associate degree conferred students into a baccalaureate degree program without jeopardizing the intended mission and stated goals of either institution.

Purpose

The agreement defines a structure through which articulation on all levels will be supported. This agreement is specifically designed to allow for maximum transfer of credit and a seamless transition for students earning an associate degree. Development and distribution of all transfer articulation products (e.g. brochures, checklists or transfer guides) are the responsibility of the University of Phoenix. The University of Phoenix will consider the input from Independence Community College so that the most efficient transfer possible may be achieved for the student. The University of Phoenix and Independence Community College agree to develop a working plan to accomplish students' transition between associate and baccalaureate degrees.

Transfer Features and Benefits

- All credit from associate degrees (including vocational degrees), awarded by Independence Community College
 will transfer to the University of Phoenix, meaning that all associate degree-related courses, subject to program
 limitations detailed on the transfer literature, will automatically transfer.
 - Although credits will be accepted in transfer, additional general education credits may be needed to fulfill the
 program requirements.
 - Students from Independence Community College will be granted admission to a baccalaureate degree
 program at the University of Phoenix based on academic requirements as a result of having earned an
 associate degree and upon further satisfaction of all other conditions for admission as stated in the University
 Catalog. University of Phoenix admission requirements may be viewed at www.phoenix.edu
- If the student is enrolled in the Bachelor of Science in Management program (in states where offered), the associate degree focus will be listed as an area of emphasis on the baccalaureate transcript and University of Phoenix diploma.
- 3. Students from Independence Community College, who are within 12 months of the completion of their associate degree, may pre-apply to a University of Phoenix baccalaureate program and will be granted access to the University of Phoenix University Library Online Collection. Continued access to these services following the 12-month period will require students to be enrolled in the University.

Services Provided to Independence Community College by the University of Phoenix

- Transfer support material will be provided by University of Phoenix.
- 2. University of Phoenix campus will provide onsite or online counseling services.
- University of Phoenix will provide information about Independence Community College to students who do not meet University of Phoenix admission requirements or who need additional program prerequisites or requirements.
- University of Phoenix will provide onsite training to advisors of Independence Community College regarding the use of transfer literature.

- Independence Community College will provide the opportunity for University of Phoenix representative to meet with the Independence Community College students on an ongoing basis.

This agreement will automatically renew on an annual basis thereafter unless terminated sooner as set forth herein. Transfer literature will be updated on an annual basis. AGREEMENT OF UNDERSTANDING

between

Kansas Wesleyan University

and

Independence Community College

This articulation agreement is entered into between Independence Community College and Kansas Wesleyan University.

Kansas Wesleyan University assures the acceptance of any Independence Community College Associate of Arts (AA) and Associate of Science (AS) graduate as a baccalaureate degree-seeking student with junior standing.

Kansas Wesleyan University will honor the agreement of the Kansas Board of Regents to facilitate the ease of transition of students from in-state community college to four-year institutions. Although the following distribution of courses does not necessarily correspond to the general education requirements for the bachelor degree from Kansas Wesleyan University, it shall be accepted as having satisfied the general education requirements for the bachelor degree.

A minimum of 45 credit hours of general education with distribution in the following fields shall be required. General education hours totaling less than 45 shall be accepted, but transfer students must complete the remainder of this requirement before graduation from Kansas Wesleyan University, which may require an additional semester(s). Under this agreement the following are required:

- Independence Community College students must graduate with an Associate of Arts (A.A.) degree or Associate of Science (AS) and with a GPA of at least a 2.0.
- Independence Community College students must complete a minimum of 45 hours of liberal studies with distribution in the following areas:
 - **12 hours** of Basic Skills courses: **6 hours** of English composition, **3 hours** of Speech Communication, and **3 hours** of College-level Mathematics.
 - 12 hours of Humanities courses from at least three of the following disciplines: Art, Theatre, Philosophy, Music, History, or Literature (Note: performance courses are excluded).
 - **6 hours** of Social and Behavioral Science courses from at least two of the following disciplines: Sociology, Psychology, Political Science, Economic, Geography, or Anthropology.
 - **6 hours** of Natural and Physical Science courses from at least two disciplines (lecture with lab).
 - **9 hours** of electives from the areas of Humanities, Social and Behavioral Science, or Natural and Physical Science.

Interested Students should note:

- 1. All graduates of Kansas Wesleyan University are required to take a 3 hour Bible course.
- 2. To graduate from Kansas Wesleyan, transfer students must meet all other prerequisite, program, degree, and residency requirements as described in the KWU Academic Catalog.
- Students with other degrees from Independence Community College are not included in this agreement. KWU welcomes those students, but will assess their transcripts on an individual basis.
- 4. Independence Community College students will receive full consideration for all forms of federal, state, and institutional financial aid, based on results of their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) data and their cumulative Independence GPA. Transfer students will also be eligible for housing in KWU dorms, and other student services, such as academic advising and the Student Success Center.
- 5. Independence Community College and Kansas Wesleyan University will include information about this agreement in their college publications.
- 6. This agreement replaces any previous agreement. It may be terminated by either party with notice of at least one year.

BETWEEN OTTAWA UNIVERSITY AND

Independence Community College

This agreement is entered into between Ottawa University, a Kansas corporation, herein referred to as "Ottawa", and Independence Community College, herein after referred to as "Independence CC".

Whereas, Ottawa has over 150 years of demonstrated academic excellence in delivering high quality, university educational programs through a variety of delivery systems, and Independence CC has a reputation for excellence in providing programs designed to train people in a variety of careers.

Whereas, Ottawa and Independence CC agree that cooperation between them may be of benefit to both parties and their constituencies and their constituencies by increasing graduation rates at the associates and bachelors levels.

Therefore, Ottawa and Independence CC desire to enter into a mutually beneficial agreement whereby the parties agree to abide by all the terms and conditions set forth in this agreement as follows:

- 1. Effective from the Ottawa term beginning August 18, 2021, Ottawa will offer a reduction in tuition to any Independence CC associate degree graduate who transfers to complete a baccalaureate degree program at Ottawa University. The transfer advantage program will reduce the per credit hour tuition paid by the new student to an effective rate \$150 below the posted rate for online, standard Bachelor's level coursework. Tuition rates are subject to change. The reduction in tuition is limited to one baccalaureate degree per student, and to coursework which applies to the student's program of choice. Coursework may be completed online or on campus at Ottawa University's adult locations as course offerings are available. Students may begin in any term throughout the academic year. The student is eligible to receive the reduced tuition rate for two (2) years from the start of their first course, or until completion of the baccalaureate degree whichever occurs first.
- Additionally, Ottawa will offer a 20% tuition reduction to employees of Independence Community College who enroll in a baccalaureate or graduate degree program through Ottawa University's Adult Professional and Graduate online campus. The incentive is limited to one baccalaureate or graduate degree per employee of Independence CC.

- 3. As part of this agreement, Independence CC agrees to assist in informing students of this transfer advantage benefit using existing channels and resources, as well as others upon which the parties may mutually agree. Ottawa invites Independence CC to participate in joint announcements of this agreement, and in lending the use of its name and logos for this purpose in promotional materials, mailing pieces, digital media, or other items by mutual agreement. It is understood that either party using the other's name and logos will obtain the approval of the other party prior to its distribution. Each party agrees to acknowledge and recognize the agreement on each institution's website and via other marketing and publicity methods. Independence CC agrees to provide Ottawa with access to graduate directory contact information (including mailing addresses, emails, and phone numbers), in compliance with FERPA regulations, to enable Ottawa to contact potential program applicants
- 4. Residential Scholar Scholarship (RSS): Separate from the scholarship identified in Section 1 above, Independence CC associate degree graduates are eligible to receive an annual \$10,000 Ottawa University tuition scholarship to attend the traditional residential campus in Ottawa, Kansas. The RSS scholarship is subject to the admissions policies of the College, acceptance to the bachelor's degree program at the College, and attendance and residence at the College. In addition to these policies, if awarded the RSS, students are required to be continuously enrolled each term to retain eligibility for the scholarship. This program is separate and unique from the educational opportunity mentioned in #1 above. The annual \$10,000 RSS scholarship cannot be used in conjunction with any other local aid/scholarships (i.e.: potential merit award) and any recipient of the \$10,000 scholarship must complete the federal financial form (FAFSA) to apply for federal and state financial aid to determine the best use of aid for each individual student and to apply any available grants.
- 5. Ottawa will award and transcript college-level credit earned through the successful completion of any associate degree program awarded by Independence CC. Varsity sports, developmental, remedial, and courses that are not applicable to Independence CC degree will not transfer. Activity courses, such as skill building, physical, and musical activities, will be limited to four credits for each area. Coursework from other institutions accepted toward the Independence CC associates degree will be evaluated and transcribed in compliance with Ottawa's transfer policy. Coursework from other institutions and credit for prior learning accepted toward the Independence CC associates degree will be evaluated and transcribed in compliance with Ottawa's transfer policy and may result in a difference of credit than granted by Independence CC.
- 6. Ottawa will accept a maximum of 80 credits from Independence CC toward the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree. Of the 124 semester hours of credit required for graduation, a minimum of 30 hours must be completed at Ottawa University, including a minimum of 12 hours of upper division coursework in the

major. The student must also complete a minimum of 44 hours of upper division coursework.

7. Adult and Online Studies: Ottawa's General Education requirements are organized into four areas called Breadth Areas; Art/Expression, Social/Civic Studies, Science/Description and Value/Meaning. Demonstration of competence in the Liberal Arts breadth areas includes completion of a minimum 6 semester hours of credit. A student gaining an associate degree from Independence CC will typically have fulfilled Ottawa's breadth area requirements as a result of completing Independence CC requirements. Should breadth area courses be lacking, these will be available through the student's regular course of study at Ottawa University. Ottawa recognizes that learning in these four areas may be achieved in varied ways through different classes and/or tests, depending on students' needs, interests, and educational backgrounds. Students must also successfully complete the LAS sequence of courses at Ottawa, consisting of a minimum of LAS 30012 Writing and Critical Thinking in the Liberal Arts and LAS 45012 Global Issues in the Liberal Arts, and UNV 11000 Seminar for Significance.

Residential Campus: Students must complete the appropriate liberal arts interdisciplinary seminars based on their student classification at entry, the information literacy requirement, religion requirement, eight breadth area requirements, as well as writing and computational competencies.

8. Adult and Online Studies: Only courses for which students have received a grade of "C" or better (2.0 on a 4.0 scale) can be transferred and applied toward degree requirements to satisfy major/minor/concentration and breadth area requirements. Courses with a grade of "D" will be considered for application toward the required 124 credits needed for graduation. Students must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.00 to graduate from Ottawa.

Residential Campus: Only courses for which students have received a grade of "C" or better (2.0 on a 4.0 scale) can be transferred and applied toward degree requirements to satisfy major/minor/concentration requirements. Courses with a grade of "D" will be considered for application toward seminar, religion, and breadth area requirements and toward the required 124 credits needed for graduation. Students must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.00 to graduate from Ottawa.

Each of the parties is responsible respectively to maintain their offerings according
to the academic standards which meet all the standards for accreditation by the
Higher Learning Commission - Ottawa and Independence CC.

- 10. Ottawa agrees that it will not disclose or authorize anyone else to disclose or use or make known for another's benefit any confidential information or data of Independence CC and/or its students in any way acquired under this Agreement unless required by law or court order. This includes, but is not limited to, information pertaining to students covered by The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Ottawa shall promptly notify Independence CC of all requests or demands for information related to Independence CC students it receives in connection with any legal, governmental, or other proceeding or investigation unless otherwise prohibited by law.
- 11. Notice: Any notices to be given to Ottawa and Independence CC under the terms of this agreement shall be in writing and addressed as follows:

- 12. Ottawa and Independence CC agree to negotiate in good faith any necessary amendments to this agreement. In the event a change to this agreement is needed to implement and operate this program successfully over time, or to add or delete program and/or Ottawa credit awards, a written amendment signed by an authorized representative of both Ottawa and Independence CC shall be required. Upon execution, such amendment shall be incorporated by addendum as part of this agreement.
- 13. Either party may terminate this agreement within 120 days written notice. Either party may terminate this agreement for the material noncompliance of the other party by providing that other party 30 days written notice of termination. If the noncomplying party fails to resolve its noncompliance within the 30-day period, or makes no attempt to do so, the termination shall be effective immediately. Immediate termination is possible only by mutual consent. Such termination shall not affect students already accepted by Ottawa pursuant to this agreement.
- 14. To the extent permitted by law, each party shall hold the other party hamnless for any actions or omissions on the part of its employees or agents. Both parties agree to use alternative dispute resolution procedures to the extent permitted by law.

- 15. Neither party shall illegally discriminate in either the provision of services, or in employment, against any person because of sex, age, race, disability, national origin, veteran's status, sexual orientation, color, or religion, and agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state laws, rules, regulations and executive orders relating to nondiscrimination, equal employment opportunity, immigration and affirmative action. Both parties' services and facilities shall comply with all applicable laws, including the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act, relating to persons with disabilities.
- 16. This agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Kansas. If any term or provision of this document shall be held illegal, unenforceable, or in conflict with any law governing this document, the validity of the remaining provisions shall not be affected thereby.

- 20. Ottawa University reserves the right to make changes of any nature to its degree programs and requirements for admission, including changes in the transferability of coursework credits.
